### Description

Government 2305 is a study of the organization, functions, and administration of the several branches and agencies of the national government, including a study of the federal constitution. The primary factors considered relate to the three branches of government -- judicial, executive, legislative -- major historical documents, the events that shaped the nation, and current events. Emphasis will be placed on the interaction of these subsystems. 48 contact hours. Credit: Three semester hours.

Research assignments should be saved and submitted in a Word or .rtf format with normal alignment and font size 12 Times New Roman settings.

### Quizzes

Online quizzes through W.W. Norton publishing are assigned for each chapter. We will be using the Inquisitive website. When you purchase a new textbook, there will be a code on a postcard in the front of the book to access Inquisitive. Follow the link in e-campus and enter the code from the postcard in front of your textbook into the Inquisitive website. Complete each Inquisitive in alignment with the course schedule.

Quizzes cannot be made up or taken afterwards, unless a school approved trip or religious activity interferes that you have proper documentation for to present to me prior to that activity occurring. Grades will be made available immediately after submission through the "Progress" tab on ecampus, underneath "grades."

### Discussion Board

You will have a discussion board for each module of the course. Students will write an original post based on the prompt assigned in the discussion forum. Students will also respond to two other students posts each module. The original post and replies will be due by the due date listed in the schedule.

## Honorlock

Honorlock will proctor your exams this semester. Honorlock is an online proctoring service that allows you to take your exam from the comfort of your home. You DO NOT need to create an account, download software, or schedule an appointment in advance. Honorlock is available 24/7 and all that is needed is a computer, a working webcam, and a stable Internet connection.

To get started, you will need Google Chrome and the Honorlock Chrome Extension. You can download the extension at [www.honorlock.com/extension/install](http://www.honorlock.com/extension/install).

When you are ready to test, log into D2L, go to your course, and click on your exam. Clicking "Launch Proctoring" will begin the Honorlock authentication process, where you will take a picture of yourself, show your ID, and complete a scan of your room. Honorlock will be recording your exam session by webcam, as well as recording your screen. Honorlock also has an integrity algorithm that can detect search-engine use, so please do not attempt to search for answers, even if it's on a secondary device.
